The 16 large villages are:

Albertfalva, Békásmegyer, Budatétény,

Cinkota, Mátyásföld, Nagytétény, Pesthidegkút,

Pestszentimre, Pestújhely, Rákoscsaba, Rákoshegy,

Rákoskeresztúr, Rákosliget, Rákosszentmihály, Sashalom, Soroksár.

What is Budapest like?

Budapest has two parts: Buda and Pest.

Pest is flat.

Pest is loud and crowded.

Buda has many hills and valleys.

The Danube River flows between Buda and Pest.

Near the Danube, there are streets for people walking and streets for cars.

People in Budapest live in different types of houses.
